

After the Mokupuni, members of Po'okela served a delicious meal. Joining in the day's activities were WBM members Gael Ito, who has agreed to be the new Po'okela representative and other Po'okela members Carrie Thompson, Margaret Raymond, Kats Enoki, Lynn Story and myself. In addition, Joyce Bergantino, Keolahou Hawaiian Church WBM representative, came from Kihei. We were delighted to make a few friends from other churches. We were hoping to see Youlida Yoruw, but she was unable to attend.

We took some time to talk about the goals for our group to contribute to the WBM. A few ladies brought cancelled stamps for our gathering and others in the future will bring toiletries to share. We also talked about the support that the WBM gives to the shelters for women in need. Edith Kapiko from Keawalai Church made a donation during the previous week at my bible study group which I will forward to the O'ahu office.

We had a short meeting to talk about how we wanted to proceed in our gatherings. We decided to begin with supporting our sister churches events. The Spring Break Youth Camp was from March 18-21 and the Church of the Pacific generously offered their grounds for the event. The theme of the camp was *God is the Adventure*. A \$3,000 Mabel Wilcox grant was received. It was written by Pastor Olaf. The fee for the camp was \$18.00 per student. This camp included fun water activities for the youth like surfing and canoeing. The new youth ministry leader from Waimea United Church, Clint Snyder assisted with the water activities. The youth at camp also worked with the Church of the Pacific's food pantry and garden. The Women's Board of Missions provided

camp fee sponsorships for four Marshallese youth.

A pay forward type of Leadership Formation for Youth and Young Adults is being formulated and was presented at the February WBM meeting. The project is called *Sacred Day Walk*. This project is due to a Christian youth named Meleane Moala wanted to build up the Christian Spirit in lives of young people who like herself feel a strong desire to share Christ with others and would like more training in ministering to others, and time to develop a deeper sense of their own call to Christian sharing. This grew out of her Senior Project that also included a UCC Pastor. She gathered young women who were unchurched and through a weekend of prayer and conversation exposed them to the heart of Christian faith: the love and fellowship of Christ which he offers to all who accept and embrace him. Meleane is a youth member at Lihue United Church and attends Kapaa High School.

The YMCA Camp Naue on the north shore of Kaua'i has been reserved for spring 2014 and assign for use to the Woman's Board of Missions if needed.

The February 19 edition of "The Garden Isle" reported that graffiti vandals struck the Waimea Christian Education Center and After School Program. It has been repainted. Pastor Bemry Lieney Bunglick of the Marshallese UCC in Hanapepe was interviewed by the Garden Island Newspaper. It included a picture with himself and Diem Clements, director of the Marshallese Community Organization. In the newspaper picture they are holding a scale replica of a traditional Marshallese tibnoi sailing canoe he built with the assistance of a microenterprise grant. The headline reads Marshallese community adjusts to life on Garden Isle. It was acknowledged in the article that Mayor Carvalho appreciates a large group of Marshallese who help maintain parks the Hanama'ulu area.







# MISSION POSSIBLE: KOKOKAHI UCC TROPICAL HUNGER PROJECT



Over the last few months many of you as individuals or churches donated sewing supplies consisting of fabric, thread, scissors, needles, buttons, zippers, Velcro, yarn, batting, measuring tapes, pins and more for the UCC Kokokahi Tropical Hunger Mission. Roger Butlig is our Field Representative in Cagayan de Oro. He runs our demonstration farm at his house just outside Cagayan de Oro on Mindanao, the most southern island in the Philippines. He conducts trainings to teach other villages, organic sustainable farming, so families are taught to fish rather than giving them a meal. Kokokahi funded a community center that sleeps a dozen people where they come to stay for a week or longer to learn how to grow food for their families.

The items made will be used to clothe the families and some sold by the women to raise funds for food. While they are able to generate income this way, their needs are still excessively great.









Initially the sewing supplies were to be utilized by a group of women from Upper Kam-is which is situated 5 kilometers from Roger's farm. This village has no electricity, so manual sewing machines were purchased with funds sent by the UCC Woman's Board of Missions. Many factors contributed to holding the sewing and trainings at Roger's demonstration farm in the community center.

A government partnership was made and more sewing machines were purchased allowing many more women from other villages to be trained to sew as well. This is a good thing as Hawaii's churches and individuals were so generous with their donations of sewing supplies. You made this project a success!







We have incorporated the sewing along with the growing of crops that these families can use to feed themselves. Roger writes "The more participants we have on this training the more backyard garden we make.....so far we have now in the list about 23 mothers mam, i know there are more mothers will join this training when they heard that we are going to start."

After they grow crops successfully at Roger's farm they will be supplied with tools to farm in their own villages. Roger says "Yes mam....my proposal about the tools mam, if we are going to give each mother a set of garden tools that will cost us a lot but if we group them into several groups and let them helping each other especially those who are neighborhood i think it is much lesser and the impact of being trusting each other will be realize."



#### **LUDWIG NOTES**

Caleb and Rose Ludwig have been full time missionaries in Fiji for the past 12 years. Their family has been commissioned to move back to Guam to restart the Campus Crusade for Christ Ministry at the University of Guam, and to also minister to inland communities in Micronesia.

As our WBM continues to offer support to the Ludwig family, and as they prepare to leave for Guam, Caleb sent a prayer request as follows:

"Pray that Rose will obtain her visa to work on Guam before we leave Fiji in April. Pray for the needed funds for our travel. We plan to stop in Hawaii and Pohnpei before heading to Guam. Pray that God will rise up all our needed financial support to live and do ministry in Guam. Pray for our children's schooling needs and that they will be able to continue their education in Guam without interruption of their grade levels. This is mostly important to Annette who will be finishing high school this year. Thank you for your prayers."

The Woman's Board of Missions for the Pacific Islands was blessed to celebrate the Kaua'i Island book launch of the "Memoirs of Henry Obookiah" on March 21, 2013 at Lihue United Church.

The evening began with a prelude of music by the worship team at Lihue Missionary Church and was followed by a Pu wehe by Alohi Blackstad of the Na Keiki O Koloa Halau. The young ladies of Na Keiki O Koloa chanted an oli and the Reverend Remond Jeike, FMUCC and Pastor Wesley Elmore of the host church led the congregation in pule. A resounding and heartfelt welcome and reflection was delivered by the Reverend Dr. Nani Hill, the Kahu at Hanapepe Hawaiian Congregational Church. Na Keiki O Koloa responded in worship as they offered a hula to Ke Akua through "The Prayer." WBM President Karen Welsh spoke about the journey of faith that Henry took, and Deborah Li'ikapeka Lee, the project coordinator for Ahahui O 'Opukaha'ia, followed with readings from the book and explaining the return of Henry's body from Connecticut to Hawaii with an amazing talk, slideshow and video. A PowerPoint presentation of historic pictures was also shown while the Lihue United Chapel Choir, under the direction of Lois Ricciardi, sang a heart-rendering "Walk Worthy". The Reverend Dr. Nani Hill closed the program with a book blessing and Karen Welsh dismissed the attendees with a prayer of thanksgiving for the book, along with the food and fellowship that followed in the fellowship hall.

"It was a historic event that we were impressed to bring to Kaua'i Island," Welsh said. "I am so thankful for all the participants, as they added greatly to the depth of the event."
