



UCCP PASUQUIN LEARNING CENTER

Aloha to Everyone!!

My husband and I spent a little over a month in the Philippines where the UCCP Learning Center is located. While we were there, we had the privilege of observing the operation of the Learning Center. I spent most of my time reviewing the curriculum and methodology and spending time with the teachers. "Gold", my husband, audited their financial procedures and reporting.

The new minister, the Reverend Lynn Gumallaoi (photo) and I agreed that a regular review of the policies, procedures, and curriculum have to be done to keep the lessons fresh and interesting for the children. Music has always been strength in the curriculum but since the departure of our music teacher, Archie Cortez last year, this task has been passed on to our regular teachers. The addition of a part time music teacher to teach every Friday is a focus for the school this school year. It is not only a fun way for the children to learn, but music is also an outreach to the community.



As I reported in the past, every first Sunday of the month the UCCP Learning Center children sing during worship. They make a good part of the church's children's choir.





Many of the children's parents are either non-church goers or Roman Catholics. They attend the church service on the first Sunday to see their children sing in worship – a very powerful outreach ministry for the church.




A typical school day starts with a flag ceremony and exercise.

There are three classes at the Learning Center. The nursery, ages 2-1/2 to 3; kindergarteners, ages 3-1/2 to 5; and the preparatory class, ages 5 to 6-1/2 that meets in the afternoons. The prep class curriculum emphasizes reading, writing, and arithmetic in preparation to entering first grade the following year. Parents and surrounding elementary schools report that our Learning Center graduates are more focused in class and seem to assimilate well.

Learning is a family affair! In October the Learning Center observed National Language week. The culture and languages (dialects) of the Philippines is emphasized in the curriculum for the week. The children and parents were involved in activities in preparation for the culmination of the observance.



A school assembly was held on Friday to share what was learned during the week. There were presentations of dances and songs as well as a parade by the children dressed in different native wear. Some of the parents got together to do a dance performance for the children, parents and guests. The members of the church and the school families are very grateful for the financial blessings through the Woman's Board of Missions, the Moanalua Community Church, and individual supporters who generously share their blessings. We all met by the Discovery Center, in Kaka'ako, shared a prayer, swept the outer park, and then the beach parks. People were so open and unguarded when they were approached by happy, enthusiastic children. You could see their faces as the children approached them. We spent time talking with people. They were friendly and shared some of their personal stories. One woman cried upon receiving a pair of eyeglasses when we visited River Street. Chinatown's homeless population was older & needed the glasses the most. We began at 2:00 p.m. and finished at 6:00 p.m. We ran out of supplies as many approached us having heard we were there. A great need for toiletries was expressed by people in Iwilei & Chinatown. My heart was touched and enriched as we shared what we had with others. As I said before, many of us could easily be in their place as a result of a death or loss of a job.

WOMEN'S COMMUNITY CORRECTIONAL CENTER (WCCC)

We continue to support our sisters who are incarcerated at the Women's Community Correctional Center here in Hawai'i.

Last year, during a visit with Warden Mark Patterson, he appealed to me to encourage our WBM to adopt the women in the Acute Mental Health Unit. Because funding from the State is typically inadequate in meeting the needs of the program, supplemental support often comes from churches, organizations, and others in the community.

On Wednesday, November 28, 2012, I met with Warden Patterson and toured the facility. Our new member and one of our partners, Tracey Holcomb (Sisters Going Deeper in God) joined me. We were greatly moved by the stories of the women, but extremely impressed with the cultural and needs-specific programs that Warden Patterson and his staff have worked so diligently and compassionately to create. As the women successfully complete the program(s) required, some become mentors for others.

During our tour of the facility, we had the privilege of meeting Haneefbilal, a clinical social worker and psychologist in the Acute Mental Health Unit, who shared a little about the kinds of treatment women receive. We also met and listened to a woman's firsthand account of her experience and how the program has allowed her to heal and find peace. She now realizes that she can now encourage and mentor others when she is released.

There is an ongoing need for toiletries (both full size and travel size) and supplies for the women in the Acute Mental Health Unit. The following is a list of these items:

Chips


